But hope is at hand. At a meeting in Trowbridge in March, the TransWilts Community Rail Partnership was set up with a view to making the line a regular route. If successful, travellers

will be able to get from Salisbury to Swindon, via Warminster, Dilton Marsh, Westbury, Trowbridge, Melksham and Chippenham. Other than saving on petrol, time is another factor favouring the line. Estimated travel time by rail from Trowbridge to Swindon is 35 minutes as opposed to over an hour and a half by bus. 

The facts of the matter are straightforward. Warminster Town Council used to pay an annual sum of £36,000 for the two-hour

free parking that visitors and residents alike enjoyed. But after a review throughout the county, Wiltshire Council increased this demand to £150,000, which represents just under half of the annual precept. This was refused by the Town Council and Wiltshire Council came back with revised offers. These were discussed at an Extraordinary Meeting of the Full Council at the Assembly Rooms on 12th May and then taken to the Area Board meeting at Dewey House on 20th May. Discussions

MAYOR'S COMMUNITY DAY

Cllr Tony Nicklin hosted the Mayor's Community Day on 27th February when the Assembly Rooms were packed with an estimated 500 visitors. Representatives of more than 60 local businesses and organisations were in attendance, including the Town Council. The Mayor took the opportunity to conduct his survey on the issues surrounding Dewey House, the Assembly Rooms and the Old Town Hall. Whilst the majority supported the retention of Dewey House for community hiring purposes, a narrow gap separated the 'yeas' from the 'nays' on the question of the Assembly Rooms' refurbishment plans which allow for Council office space – 54 were in favour, 69 against, and 8 were undecided. The future of the Old Town Hall produced similarly narrow results. The question of whether the Council should borrow funds to buy and restore the building was as close as it gets, with 59 for, 58 against, and 13 undecided; 51 were for leaving it in commercial ownership, 42 against, and 37 undecided.

Considerable interest was also shown in the draft Town Plan with lively debate and discussion taking place at the stand with the Mayor and councillors, resulting in useful feedback for the Town Plan committee. The event was a resounding success and proved again that Warminster residents show a robust interest in their town.

Festival Everythin every two

Festival Countdown Begins

Everything is in place for this year's Warminster Festival, a once every two year event that draws in the crowds and gives a festive sparkle to the town. As always, there's something for everybody, with a menu of different happenings throughout the town that will appeal to all tastes and all ages. One of the most enduringly popular

is the Town Crier Competition, which starts the Festival on 3rd July at 10.30am. The criers will gather at the Assembly Rooms before forming a procession and proceeding, via High Street, Market Place and Weymouth Street, to the Park, where competitors from far and wide, including Belgium, will test their oratory skills.

Throughout that Saturday, and for the next seven days, Warminster will be bustling with an assortment of events held at different locations throughout the town. In fact, to keep track of the various activities will be something of a challenge, so a colourful leaflet has been produced, enabling you to see where and when the events are happening. You can pick up the leaflet at the Library and Dewey House and at many shops and outlets in the town – start highlighting those unmissable events!

CALL FOR A PARISH POLL

On 31st March a parish meeting was held in the Assembly Rooms to discuss the Town Council's proposal to refurbish the Assembly Rooms and create a Community Hub and Civic Centre which would include the Town Council offices moving from Dewey House to this new Civic Centre. This is an important issue revolving around estimated costs and possible implications. The meeting, which



was arranged following receipt of a petition on 5th March, was attended by 80 residents of the town and chaired by the then Mayor, Councillor Tony Nicklin.

Speakers called for a parish poll, the first to be held in Warminster, and proposed that the poll put the question "Do you agree with the Town Council's idea of moving to the Assembly Rooms?". The poll took place at the Assembly Rooms on 22nd April with the result that 540 voted no and 48 voted yes. The turnout for the poll was 4.71% of the electorate.
